10. NEW BUSINESS

A. Legislative Business

- Action Item: SR #2018-10: Recognition Football Exploratory Committee request for reconsideration President Nino reviewed that within the ASI Bylaws they have the power to recommend the reconsideration of resolutions. Nino noted that since the resolution was passed, there have been further developments that were left out of the discussion prior to passage.
 - Chancellor's Office proposed tuition increase: along with this tuition increase, findings of the exploratory committee could potentially increase student based fees. A failed 2012 football team referendum found that there would be an increase. Nino stated that referencing a previous referendum should present evidence in your favor, not dissuade.
 - Cost: housing location, scholarships
 - Athletics Department: consistently runs on a deficit, so taking on a new venture would be a non-feasible burden that doesn't lend to fiscal responsibility

Nino concluded that they don't feel this is the right direction for ASI Government to take as representing constituents, and doesn't believe there's been enough outreach to see if this is something students want to enter; requested a pro-reconsideration of the resolution.

VP Musman opened time for gallery comments.

Dominic, student: as a finance major, they recommend running forecasting financials; Business Department excited in a football team is financially viable; wants students to have the opportunity to make the financial decision for themselves.

Yasmin Elasmar, ASI Chief Diversity Officer: believes pursuit of a football team as an irresponsible use of time and extraneous in light of improving campus resource centers and investing in issues of marginalized students.

Jonathan Wanless, ASI Treasurer: as a former senator, Senate fought for campus resource center funding but failed; Athletics should financially support existing teams and not divert resources to a new football team; focus should be on opposing tuition increase.

VP Musman opened time for board comments.

Sen. Calder: voted against initial reading; focus should be housing and food insecurity, safe spaces on campus (i.e. Soroptimist House), and campus climate.

Sen. Carancho: there are students who want a football team; recommended garnering comprehensive feedback from students and Athletics; if ASI is to represent what students want, we need to get their opinion, not just assume.

Sen. Almahdi: majority of people they've spoken to have expressed there are other campus issues that take priority.

Sen. Macdonald asked if this resolution is to just explore the possibility of a football team and to gather feedback. Sen. Trimm replied yes, that the committee would be the only way to officially gather opinion from students and campus resources. Sen. Macdonald voiced concern that Senate view of this resolution is that it's definitive rather than its intent to be exploratory.

Sen. Honaker: concurred with Macdonald; sports bring people together; believes there can be a balance approach in meeting all campus needs.

Sen. Argent: voted for initial reading; however, if resolution passes, blame may fall on ASI for bringing discussion back especially during time of potential tuition increase.

Sen. Mejia: current resources should be allocated to current needs; should be getting feedback from prospective students, as well as current students; whatever is discussed now will be continued to be dealt with in the future.

Sen. Trimm: what message will it send to the students who do want a football team; the exploratory committee will determine if team is feasible or not; wants to show students that ASI can focus on multiple issues, points of view, needs, and student wants;

Nino reminded board to consider the end goal of exploratory committee which is to have a football team. Nino will not support this resolution since their campaign included fight against tuition increases.

Sen. Carancho asked what resources would go into exploring the committee. Haller replied, a recording secretary for meetings.

Sen. DaSilva: Senate, like any form of government, makes decisions on the majority; it's also possible to be involved in many different issues.

Sen. Macdonald motioned to appeal VP Musman's decision to end the Working Rules' twenty minute discussion period. VP Musman accepted the motion and allowed an additional five minutes.

Sen. Jurado: voted for initial reading; now believes in the possibility of passing and cannot support the financial burden, along with the potential tuition increase, it would place on future students; doesn't believe this is the time for this venture.

Sen. Balayan: CENG College Council and the majority of the CENG students will consider an exploratory committee; however, they are not in support of a football team that will call for a fee increase and does not benefit CENG students.

VP Musman: at a previous meeting with Athletics, they presented their budget which showed they've finished the past few years in the red and don't have sufficient funding for current athletes funding. Although a football team would increase funding with the implementation of a fee increase and would fund both a male and female team sport, there would be decreased funding for male sports in order to maintain equality. VP Musman stated that even if this resolution does not pass, both authors are welcome to form a working group to do research on their own.

 - Reviewed a student's concern regarding campus' Greek restaurant cooking meat in the same fryer oil as
 vegetarian items; per restaurant, items are cooked in separate fryers
 - Attended November's CSSA conference at CSU San Luis Obispo; discussed proposed state budget and its contribution implications of possibly only funding mandatory costs, not the full costs, for the CSU system
 - Attended Campus Planning Committee; discussed new location of the Soroptimist House; discussed conceptual sustainability area of the new Soroptimist House
 - Met with Provost Jersky and President Conoley to discuss current campus issues
 - On search committee for Vice President of Administration and Finance; first candidate will be visiting campus on 12-8-17; next two candidates will visit next week
 - Ongoing discussions with Athletics Director Andy Fee regarding the Beach Pride Referendum
 - Attended Alcohol, Tobacco and Other Drugs (ATOD) Advisory Council meeting; discussed tailgating issue
 - Although marijuana will be legal in California in January 2018, CSULB abides by federal law, so it's still illegal
 - Chancellor's Office released a proposed tuition increase at the last CSU Board of Trustees meeting

C. 49er Shops, Inc. General Manager and Chief Officer Don Penrod TC 4pm Penrod reviewed conversation with Dean of Students Piya Bose regarding student feedback of ordering offcampus food for events.

Sen. Carancho stated that organizations are being told they cannot be reimbursed for any non-catered food, even for non-event, regular meetings. Sen. Carancho noted it would be helpful if the policy should be available online. Penrod reported that the policy language is available online with the list of approved caterers on the 49er Shops website.

Penrod stated that on-campus vendors can be utilized, donations can be utilized, and cultural exceptions are accepted.

Sen. Carancho stated that what's a common good for the university is an inconvenience and burden for the students. Students don't have the financial means to solely utilize the five listed vendors. It's also inconvenient to have to fill out a policy waiver for a general student meeting item such as water or a pizza. Carancho voiced

support for a policy revision to address these concerns because it concerns not only the Senate but affects the entire student body. Penrod voiced that he wants to help meet student needs rather than going through a policy generating process, and asked for specific suggestions such as competitive pricing.

Sen. Yamagiwa asked if the Board of Control should be advising organizations who want to serve cultural food at their event that they also need to fill out a policy waiver on top of the other required forms. Penrod recognized that there needs to be a mechanism in place for compliance, and voiced support for having organizations place their order, go online to complete the policy waiver, and the 49er Shops would figure it all out from there.

Sen. Basavanna asked if the purchasing exclusivity is an issue of license or insurance. Penrod replied no, it's a matter of it being a viable economic model of profit. Penrod stated that Becky Drouin has proposed student pricing for consideration, and encouraged senators to meet with Drouin to review pricing and offer feedback. Penrod reiterated that they want to meet issues as much as they can.

Sen. Carancho requested Penrod to advise Student Life and Development to waive general student meeting food items for the spring semester while this issue is being resolved. Penrod agreed.

12. VOLUNTARY CLOSING COMMENTS

VP Musman: requested board to complete and submit the Vice President Evaluation Form; reminded board members who are participating in Secret Senator that they have until Tuesday to deliver their gifts; encouraged board to advertise and recruit for ASI Government spring vacancies.

Sen. Carancho: invited board to meet during winter break to work on the tuition increase resolution, especially as the California State University Board of Trustees (CSU BOT) meets in six weeks to vote on the issue.

Sen. Argent: University Ambassador fundraiser for the Beach Pantry, December 6th, 6-9pm, Zero Express.

Sen. Yamagiwa: encouraged the board to support the Clean Dream Act, thirteen student Dreamers will be fasting for three days in downtown Los Angeles; La Raza fundraiser, January 7th, 12-10:30pm Frostbites; Research Initiative for Scientific Enhancement (RISE) information session, January 7th, 6-7pm, USU-307.

Sen. Aranas awarded Senator of the Week to Sen. Mejia. Sen. Aranas, who is graduating at the end of the fall semester, thanked the board for their commitment and comradery, and encouraged them not to let their position limit their ability and potential in life.

Sen. Jurado: will not be returning as a senator in the spring; thanked the board for their commitment to their goals and encouraged them in their endeavors.

Sen. Al-Busaidi: will not be returning as a senator in the spring; thanked the board for their comradery and encouraged them to keep up the good work.
