New Wheel Paths coming in Spring:

- Consulted with many campus groups: police, faculty, staff, and students (including skateboard riders) about issues and solutions
- Had wheel study conducted as part of master planning to see major congestion areas and natural paths of travel
- Coming in spring: wheel paths through most of upper campus
- Painted lines on major walks to allow for pedestrians and wheels
- Bidirectional
- Off of major thoroughfares
- Dismount areas
- Encouraging alternative transportation
- Pedestrians always have the right of way; wheel speed limit is 5 mph
- Pilot program

Altman: Pleased to see that they were not just working on alternate modes of transportation but more specific for pedestrians. This would definitely improve student safety.

De Silva: What happens in lower campus as there is a big hill from lower campus to upper campus.

Dr. Klaus: There is a zigzag that goes up that hill. There is already a plan and the campus leadership were on board with this plan. They are putting resources to make this work. This is the best committee I have worked with during my career. Their commitment to this process; what's realistic and what would work. We think this pilot would be effective.
