## THE SENATE OF THE ASSOCIATED STUDENTS CALIFORNIA STATE UNIVERSITY, LONG BEACH

WHEREAS	the Associated Students, Incorporated (ASI) Board of Directors at California State University, Long Beach (CSULB) is the recognized voice for over 37,000 students; and
WHEREAS	it is the mission of the ASI Board of Directors at CSULB to "facilitate the achievement of students' education objectives and life goals through programs, services, [and] facilities that advocate student needs and interests, compel student representation in campus decision making and provide students with resources that they identify as necessary for their intellectual, social and physical development <sup>1</sup> " and
WHEREAS	it is the mission of the California State University system to "achieve success for all students through a quality education matched with opportunity <sup>2</sup> " and more-so the California State University system celebrates itself for its "commitment to diversity, inclusion and excellence… [it] is a stalwart advocate for student achievement, irrespective of background or life circumstance; <sup>3</sup> " and
WHEREAS	if it is the mission of both the ASI Board of Directors and the California State University system to "facilitate the achievement of students' education objectives…irrespective of background or life circumstance" then it is imperative that both institutions examine and eliminate all barriers facing prospective and current students that prove antithetical to the mission statements of both of the aforementioned institutions such as the SAT and ACT examinations administered by the College Board; and
WHEREAS	ASI understands the variances in education a prospective college student receives in their K-12 education, and the CSU system admits students from different states and different countries; and
WHEREAS	ASI recognizes the attempt that standardized tests are used to account for these variances in education; however, the SAT/ACT does not accurately account for these variances in education; and
WHEREAS	in a press release issued on April 17, 2020, the California State University announced they will "temporarily suspend the use of ACT/SAT examinations in determining admission eligibility for all CSU campuses for the 2021-22 academic year," and CSU Chancellor Timothy P. White states "this temporary change will ensure equitable access to the university, and should provide some measure of relief to prospective students and their families, <sup>4</sup> " thus Chancellor White recognizes that there needs to be equitable access to the university; and

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- WHEREAS the SAT/ACT examinations issued by the College Board presents an inequitable barrier that disproportionately affects students of low-income and students of color and does not prove to be an accurate measure of success for students entering institutions of higher education; and
- WHEREAS the National Center for Fair & Open Testing has affirmed that "40 percent of all four-year colleges and universities are now 'test-optional,' including more than half of U.S. News & World Report's top 100 liberal arts colleges;<sup>5</sup>" and
- WHEREAS Saul Geiser, a research associate at the Center for Studies in Higher Education at the University of California, Berkeley has submitted findings on November 15, 2015 in regards to SAT testing that, "after controlling for [socioeconomic status], SAT scores are a relatively poor predictor of how students will perform in college, especially students of color;<sup>6</sup>" and
- WHEREAS the University of North Carolina System piloted a program which allowed three of its state universities to make the ACT/SAT tests optional for prospective students during the college admissions process; and this pilot program was created in response to "analysis and review of national research that showed the primary importance of GPA and the relative insignificance of test scores as predictors of student success.<sup>7</sup>" The pilot covered a cohort of students admitted in fall 2015 through fall 2017. In a report presented to the University of North Carolina Board of Governors in January 2020 it was determined that "the performance for the…cohorts shows no statistical difference in academic performance between the students admitted under the pilot standards and those admitted under the regular admissions standards,<sup>8</sup>" thus the standardized tests administered by the College Board are not a true indicator of student aptitude and their future academic success; now therefore, be it
- **RESOLVED** that ASI requests that CSU Chancellor White and the CSU Board of Trustees formally recognize the deficiencies of the ACT and SAT examinations when determining student success, and that the CSU system officially discontinue the use of SAT and ACT examinations in determining admission eligibility for all CSU campuses permanently starting in the year 2022-23, and be it further
- **RESOLVED** that the CSU system at the direction of Chancellor White, the CSU Board of Directors, and the succeeding CSU Chancellor develop a holistic review of the CSU admissions application that reflects the CSU mission statement and vision dedicated to its "commitment to diversity, inclusion and excellence... irrespective of background or life circumstance." A holistic admissions approach includes the implementation of written statements that explores the applicant's unique experiences and background story that will be used to evaluate the aptitude and readiness of each prospective student, in lieu of SAT/ACT scores; and be it finally
